Psalms of Lament

Out of the depths have I cried to you, O Lord; Lord, hear my voice;

I wait for the Lord; my soul waits for him; in his word is my hope.

from Psalm 130

The Psalter is the prayer book of Jesus Christ in the truest sense of the word. He prayed the Psalter and now it has become his prayer for all time...we understand how the Psalter can be prayer to God and yet God's own Word, precisely because here we encounter the praying Christ...because those who pray the psalms are joining in with the prayer of Jesus Christ, their prayer reaches the ears of God. Christ has become their intercessor...

Welcome and introduction

Welcome to this suggested outline for how you might spend some time with Psalms of Lament at home. If we had been gathered in church there would have been a quiet space and some candlelight. You might like to find a quiet and comfortable corner at home, away from distractions, to allow this to be a time of rest, reflection and intentional abiding with the psalms.

The Laments are the commonest type of psalm. They form about one third of the Psalter. They express the psalmist's response to God in a situation of need or affliction. Their structure is flexible, being made up of a number of elements, not all of which will occur in any one psalm, and the order of which varies. Some of the more common elements are:

Invocation of God

Complaint - a description of the distress of misfortune that the psalmist is suffering - perhaps the 'heart' of the lament

Petition - an appeal to God to intervene and deliver

A vow to praise and thank God following deliverance

Expression of confidence and trust in God

Exclamation of praise and thanksgiving

Throughout this short reflective liturgy feel free to say the words out loud or pray them in the silence of your heart. God is listening.

Greeting

Though we are scattered, we come together now to meet with God. Let us recognize his presence with us

Silence is kept

As God's people we have gathered: Let us worship him together.

Come O Lord and visit us in peace, that we may rejoice before you with a perfect heart.

Praise

Opening prayers

In the depths of my being I become quiet and still; I wait for you, my God, Source of my salvation Amen.

You, Lord, are in this place, Your presence fills it. Your presence is peace.

You, Lord, are in my heart, Your presence fills it. Your presence is peace.

You, Lord, are in my life, Your presence fills it. Your presence is peace. Amen

The Word of God

Psalm 54

Save me, O God, by your name and vindicate me by your power.

Hear my prayer, O God; give heed to the words of my mouth.

For strangers have risen up against me, and the ruthless seek after my life; they have not set God before them.

Behold, God is my helper; it is the Lord who upholds my life.

May evil rebound on those who lie in wait for me; destroy them in your faithfulness.



An offering of a free heart will I give you and praise your name, O Lord, for it is gracious.

For he has delivered me out of all my trouble, and my eye has seen the downfall of my enemies.

Read the psalm again slowly and notice the pattern of Invocation, Petition etc typical of the Psalms of Lament

In the time of silence which follows, you may feel prompted to reflect on something that is giving you cause to lament; to cry out to God in anguish.

Perhaps you could follow the pattern of the Psalms of Lament and use this as the basis for prayer, asking God for help.

Invocation of God

Complaint

Petition

A vow to praise and thank God

Expression of confidence and trust in God

Exclamation of praise and thanksgiving

You may wish to write down a lament during this time for reflection

Response

A time of silence (20-30 mins)

Lord, meet us in the silence and hear our prayer

At the end of the silence:

Prayers
